Central Ideas and Details

A central idea of a text is one of the main points the author is making. (Sometimes a central idea is called a main idea.) A central idea can always be supported with details from the text.

1. Read the central idea of the sections "Stolen Away" and "Slavery in America" stated in the box below. Then check the boxes next to the THREE details that <u>best</u> support the central idea.
